Around the House (1) – Novus Internet, Television and Telephone

Most residents will already be aware that Novus Corporation has been running cable up to all of the residential floors over the last month or so. This will give residents an additional choice of Internet Service Provider. Novus runs their web services on optical cables, and we are advised that upload and download speeds will be blazing. They also offer cable television and phone services, although there speed is more academic.

Further Afield - Films and Mountains

The Whistler Film Festival is shooting for dark and edgy this year.

The opening night gala will feature Canadian director/actor Jason Priestley's Cas & Dylan in its western Canadian premiere, while closing night will feature two-time Oscar-nominated director Lucy Walker's The Crash Reel, showing snowboard legend Kevin Pearce's rehabilitation process after a devastating brain injury.

Other highlights include George Sluizer's Dark Blood, the last film shot with actor River Phoenix, who died of a drug overdose in 1993, as well as special presentations of Canadian directors Don McKellar's The Grand Seduction and Jeremy Lalonde's Sex After Kids. Nature documentary film Amazonia will be the first 3-D presentation at the Festival.

And indie films such as Meth Head, featuring an unrecognizable Lukas Haas, and Cheap Thrills, with David Koechner, are also proof of the "cutting edge" approach espoused by WFF director of programming Paul Gratton.



This is the 13<sup>th</sup> iteration of the festival. It runs from December 4<sup>th</sup> until the 8<sup>th</sup>. And with snow already on many of the Whistler slopes, you might want to take your skis or board when you go up there.
