

Wrapping up this month is an exhibition at the Art Gallery concerning Emily Carr's 2 trips to Haida Gwaii. Emily Carr made the first of two trips to First Nations villages and old village sites in Haida Gwaii in 1912, during which time she produced a number of watercolours and oils on board.

She used her field studies as source material for major paintings, and the goal of these works was to capture the forms of the poles and, to a lesser degree, the circumstances of their placement in the landscape or village. Carr's second trip to Haida Gwaii occurred in 1928, when she was fifty-seven years old.

These later watercolours are different in execution—more forceful and more fully realized dimensionally—but have links to the works of 1912. Carr's failing health prevented additional trips to Haida Gwaii, but she returned to the totemic subjects toward the end of her career, when she produced two major canvases based on the 1912 sketches made in Skidegate.



**Around Town (2) – Find and Eat Local (sic)** 

Technology has come to help those looking to track down local agricultural products, or to, as they say "Eat Local." If you have an iPhone, a new app called We Heart Local helps you find the closet restaurants or food suppliers that celebrate this province's rich agricultural bounty.



Farmers and other producers recognize a real desire amongst consumers to be more aware of what they are eating, and where that food came from. The app, available only on iPhones at present, showcases outlets in the city, the Fraser Valley and in the Okanagan.

Around Town (3) - Opera's Greatest Hits

All opera companies are faced with declining attendances and the reluctance of patrons to commit to buying season tickets months in advance. So in an innovative new program, Vancouver Opera are taking their show on the road.

They bill each concert as an "intimate and affordable family concert"- an operatic tasting menu with young performers that hopes to get neophytes of all ages hooked. Numbers featured will be from Carmen (of course), The Barber of Seville and The Pearlfishers, with a few surprises thrown in for good measure.

Along with her musical achievements, Ms Mouskuri was an elected member of the European Parliament for 5 years, and she also known internationally as an ardent child-rights activist supporting significant causes. She has served as a UNICEF Goodwill Ambassador since 1993.

## **Further Afield - Victoria French Festival**

This festival sashays into our capital city for the 16<sup>th</sup> time on March 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup>, 2014.

It will feature many free performances in Centennial Square, with vendors and entertainers on site. Acts will include The Naden Band of the Royal Canadian Navy, Andy St-Louis, a songwriter from Quebec coming to BC for her first visit, Le Bal à l'huile, a traditional French music band, and Cuban-born pianist Pablo Cardenas. Cardenas will be performing with his 4-piece Latin Jazz Combo. And that's just on the Saturday.



Sunday's performances will include a percussion performance by Jordan Hansen from Drum Victoria, plus the music of Kumbia who have spiced up southern British Columbia with their hot mixture of Afro-Caribbean rhythms.

Additionally, Kouskous is a World Folk Music duo which features Mediterranean-inspired vocal inflections and guitar stylings combined with spicy and exotic Middle-Eastern rhythms, and Kikeyambay is a Victoria-based musical project
