# Around the House (1) – Keeping the Air Flowing

What information do you get from the website? What information would you like to see posted on the website?



### Around Town (1) – Vancouver Early Music Festival

The Festival begins on July 25<sup>th</sup>, and runs until August 14<sup>th</sup>. This is a superb series of seven summer evening performances on the UBC campus. The concerts feature faculty members of the summer courses, as well as local and visiting artists. Concerts take place either at the Chan or in the School of Music. The famous night market runs every Friday, Saturday and Sunday night until mid-September. ### Around Town (3) – Historic Neighbourhood Tours

The Vancouver Heritage Foundation holds its latest series of neighbourhood tours in July, with some running into August. August 14<sup>th</sup> features "Sunset," home to Vancouver's large South Asian population, and Oakridge on August 21<sup>st</sup> showcases the Canadian Pacific Railway's last subdivision. The second tour features an excellent collection of midcentury modern buildings. #### Around Town (4) – Van Morrison

Legendary Van Morrison returns to Vancouver on August 7th. Few artists have had as long and respected a career as the Irish rocker. From his early days fronting the British rock band Them, to a storied solo career that helped set the tone for the '60s and the '70s, the Irish singer has always been a leader, never a follower. Many of his jazz-, blues-, rock-, and soul-influenced records are considered classics, while Van's velvety voice is among the best known and most distinctive in all of contemporary rock. Nor has Van's productivity slowed down, or the quality of his albums deteriorated—more recent releases like No Guru No Method No Teacher, Back on Top, and his latest Pay the Devil are regarded as amongst his very best.



He is also highly respected for his songwriting abilities and, in 2003, he was inducted into the Songwriters Hall of Fame. His upcoming Vancouver show will be a chance to see one of the all-time great artists at the top of his form, singing songs millions know, and feel, by heart. It's now in its 12<sup>th</sup> year, and routinely attracts about 10,000 people each year.
