Around the House (1) - Heat Pumps

Occasionally your heat pump may stop working, perhaps because of a power outage or maybe because of problems with the heating or cooling circuits on the roof.

When the pumps restart, usually just the fan kicks in again, but the heating or cooling doesn't. You may hear your fan running, but no cool or hot air (as required) is being pumped through the vents. The solution is simple: shut your pump off at the breakers for at least 5 minutes, according to the manufacturer. This clears all of the memory boards. When you restart the pump, everything should be back to normal.

Further Afield - Victoria Symphony

A summer highlight in the Province's capital is the Victoria Symphony Splash. Put on every summer by the Victoria Symphony, the event draws up to 45,000 music enthusiasts. In the middle of the Inner Harbour sits a floating stage that hosts the day's events. People crowd the surrounding areas of the harbour for a seat and you can even rent or bring your own kayak to have the best seat from right on the water.



This year the event takes place on August 5, 2012. The day includes a family fun zone starting at 1 p.m. and the main show starting at 7:30 p.m. A few activities taking place at the family fun zone include a bouncy castle, an instrument petting zoo and face painting.

The main show includes the orchestra playing a mixture of classical and popular selections, a featured young artist and concludes with a performance of Tchaikovsky's 1812 Overture, which includes bells, cannons and of course fireworks! Wow!
