Around the House (3) - Hotel Parking Spaces



Around Town (1) - Polar Bear Swim

The Vancouver Polar Bear Swim Club is one of the largest and oldest Polar Bear Clubs in the world. Its initial swim was in 1920 when a small number of hardy swimmers took the plunge into English Bay on New Year's Day. Led by their founder, Peter Pantages, the swim has grown from around 10 swimmers in that year to the record number of 2,128 official entries in 2000.

Today, the swim takes place at 2:30pm on Sunday, January 1st. Costumes and the Peter Pantages Memorial 100 yard swim race are the highlights of this event. Registration takes place in front of the English Bay Bathhouse from 12:30pm - 2:30pm as on each New Year's Day. Donation of nonperishable food bank items will be accepted. Your free membership includes a commemorative button after you take the plunge. Note that this will be the 92nd swim held in the city.
